Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, ... to our beloved coworker Philemon ... and to the church in your house. Philemon 1:1–2

Dear Friends,

In the early days of the church people met in homes, gathering with family, friends, and neighbors to worship and study, sharing the good news of Jesus Christ crucified and risen. Philemon, a student and coworker of the Apostle Paul, opened his home in such a way. This is what Paul is referring to when he writes, "and to the church in your house." "Church in your house" took on a new meaning during COVID when worship was streamed on YouTube, Facebook, and other medias allowing people to worship at home. Some people continue to use these medias as their way of doing church. For the most part however, the idea of having church in our house—inviting others in to worship and study—isn't a routine occurrence.

Portals of Prayer Daily Devotions printed a devotion for Thursday, October 6, 1988, titled "The Church in Your House." In the devotion, it was written, "Few of us today may literally have a church in our house, but this phrase should be true in a *certain sense* of every Christian home (emphasis mine). In such a home, the members are bound together not only by family ties but also by their membership in the church, the body of Christ. Here Christ's love shines through in the daily incidents of life—patience in hectic moments, sympathy in times of disappointment, forgiveness for sins committed."

In this *sense*, the "church in your house" travels with you wherever you go. The Christian traits of "patience, sympathy, and forgiveness" are placed on Christian hearts as the Father and Son make their home in us, as it is written in John's gospel (14:23) "we come [God's people] to make a home with them."

As we enter these summer months, many of us will be traveling on vacations and will be away from our church home and church family. Meant to be relaxing and fun, vacations are sometimes stressful and taxing in need of patience, sympathy, and forgiveness. Whether we call it the church in our house or the Father and Son dwelling in us, "God's church" (the body of Christ) is a constant presence to be celebrated and shared.

As we travel, may we take time to be God's church every day in prayer, thought, word and deed.

O Lord, allow us to be like Philemon of the early church, willing to invite others into our conversations to share the good news of Jesus Christ crucified and risen for the salvation of the world. Let us bring your church into our homes today. Amen.

CALL TO ORDER – Jan Grieser

The Chair called the meeting to order at 7pm and Minister Deb provided a word for thought and prayer. Council members reviewed our Mission Statement and Values, and joined together in the Council Prayer.

MISSION STATEMENT: We celebrate God's love and forgiveness by living the Word and sharing the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

- Value #1 We believe in the Father, Son and Holy Spirit as proclaimed in the Holy Bible and the Apostles' Creed.
- Value #2– We believe that all people are justified by grace through faith and are called to forgive as we have been forgiven by God.
- Value #3 We believe that people who pray for God's guidance and work together can make things happen.

COUNCIL PRAYER: Our gracious God, You have called us to be Your people and to bring Your word to our community. Help us to respond to the guidance and direction of Your Holy Spirit, so that all we do is done according to Your will and gives praise and glory to Your name. Amen.

STATUS OF GOALS FOR COUNCIL:

Update all job descriptions and update bylaws

- Staff Support is busy creating new job descriptions June deadline
- The constitution needs updated tabled until after the July Churchwide Assembly

Develop a five-year plan for ministry and building

- It was suggested the carpet be cleaned in the east hallway and classrooms; Jacob Orwick will follow up on this. When handling fellowship hall chairs, members are asked to check for stains, tears and floor protecters on legs. If not in good shape, swap out for a newer chair in the supply room. It was noted the current table setup is good for handicapped accessibility, but not good for youth activities. After soup suppers are finished, a different setup may be considered. Buckeye flooring will be coming back to finish installation. Basketball hoops will be brought back in at that time.
- Create a rough draft of the five–year plan for ministry and building

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: The minutes of the previous meeting were approved with one correction to a Council member's contact number. The update will be given to the church secretary.

FINANCIAL REPORT – Jake Leu

- Last month the Trust Committee distributed \$25,000 to Luther Home of Mercy in Williston; \$1,200 for camperships; and \$1,000 for the LYO Giving Blitz.
- Budgeted amounts for parsonage insurance will even out at year end. With the increase in liability insurance for the church, actuals will be over and we'll need to increase the amount next year.
- The balance of the operating account is higher than normal because we're still waiting on the invoice for second half of fellowship hall flooring payment.
- Financial statements were reviewed. Total income from Jan–Apr 2025 was \$109,719.02 vs. a budgeted amount of \$77,117.33. Total expenses for the same period were \$154,866.42 actual vs. \$90,423.60 budgeted.

- Interest income generated by our Money Market account is estimated at ~\$357 for April 2025. Since the fall of 2023 we've earned \$12,685 in interest.
- The Discretionary Fund balance is now \$1,053.54. Discussion was held last month on recipients in need including Jacob Miles of Jenera who suffered a house fire several weeks ago. Deb moved that we donate \$500 of this fund to Jacob and the motion was seconded by Natalie McClelland. Motion carried.
- Designated Income received in April was \$2,050.00 of which \$100 was designated anonymously for a prayer bench. Discussion was then held on what kind of a bench and where it would be located. It was noted that some churches that have a prayer room (similar to a small chapel) inside their buildings for individual meditation.
- Total contributions received for new playground equipment is now \$11,575.

TRUSTEES REPORT – Tom Marquart

- Everything has been moved back into the Fellowship Hall. The basketball hoops have new weighted bags that are clean and should be easier to move.
- Four new chairs have been assembled and placed in the library.
- We're in the process of obtaining estimates for cleaning all carpeting throughout the church.
- It has been recommended that cracks in the parking lot be filled. An estimate of \$6,879 was obtained from Clean Line. Lee Laird believes we can do it ourselves for much less. He has located a machine to use, but would need several volunteers. The cost would be approximately \$2,000.
- Bart Welte will repair some damaged spouting at the parsonage.
- The Trustees recommend moving the ship in the Fellowship Hall to a safer location or put it in a protective case. Tom reported one of the clean air grates was knocked out during a youth event recently, so they'd like to keep the ship safe. Minister Deb suggested putting it in the welcome space in the corner where the chalk painting of a ship is located. Discussion was held on how to enforce the rules of the Fellowship Hall as far as NO kicking balls, sweeping the floor after events, etc. New rules will be created and posted in larger size and/or in color.
- Trustees are working on estimates for having all air vents cleaned throughout the church. Dan Settlage will ask a carpet cleaning service if they can do this.
- Tom Marquart has talked with Brycen Lucius to address some landscaping issues around the parsonage.

• It was recommended that Council proceed with painting poles black and installing the new church signs.

MINISTER'S REPORT HIGHLIGHTS – Deborah Noll

- Recent church activities and upcoming events were reviewed. Minister Deb noted a vacation request and will need a supply pastor on July 20.
- Steve Weihrauch reached out to request time for a temple talk in the future regarding the work of the Gideons. It was suggested that his talk serve as the message on July 20 when Minister Deb is on vacation.
- Two digital cameras were found in Minister Deb's office. She will put them on the "FREE" table because they're outdated. She also found other print files that she'd like someone else to review before they are shredded.
- It was suggested that we consider a substitute for Jane Wilch so she can take vacation days.

Reflection

When thinking about "listening to self," the first thing that I think of is a question. "What voices do I hear in my head regarding myself?" " How do I see myself?"

A lot of times, we listen to the world's standards of who we should be, and yet we aren't of the world. We aren't supposed to fit in those boxes. So, oftentimes "listening" requires building on the theme of rest that the Synod's focus in 2024. It requires pausing, stilling our souls, and putting on those noise–cancelling headphones that help us to drown out all the other voices. It's in that space that we begin to tune our ears to hear what is true. It's there that we can start to heal and listen as God continually speaks His love and adoration over us.

- 2. What truths has God spoken over you today?

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ST. PAUL EV. LUTHERAN CHURCH SEMI–ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MAY 18, 2025 – 10:15AM

PRE-CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

Council members convened in the church office to discuss cleaning machine options. The Chair distributed written notes and information about various scrubbers. Wayne Young and Jason Kemerley have met with several vendors to find the right machine for our flooring, and it is their recommendation that we go with a riding scrubber from Brown Supply Company in Lima. This is the same company from which we get our janitorial supplies, and they will also mount a cleaning solution dispenser which will correctly add the amount of solution needed for the scrubber. Jason has operated machines like this, and Wayne reported this is a smaller version of what Cory–Rawson school uses and it has worked well for many years. Jason, Wayne, Allie Settlage and the Trustees will be trained how to use the scrubber and instructions will be posted on the wall. We will also post a schedule of cleanings and when to change the scrubbing pad. Jake Leu reported that over the past several years it has cost more than \$5,000 for carpet cleaning. The consensus was in favor of the purchase.

CALL TO ORDER

Chairperson Jan Grieser called the meeting to order at 10:24am. Minister Deb Noll led the congregation in prayer, after which the Sunday School offering was collected.

APPROVE MINUTES OF 2024 ANNUAL MEETING

Following review, the minutes of the November 2024 congregational meeting were approved as written.

MINISTER'S REPORT

A written report by Minister Deb Noll was attached to the agenda. She noted that Kendra Parke has offered to reorganize the St. Paul library. This project brought attention to the need for a *History Team* to look at options for displaying items currently on the shelves, and to look ahead (prior to the 195th Shipwreck Anniversary in 2026) and write an addendum to the existing Shipwreck narrative, explaining the history of how we have come to worship in our current building. Please let Kendra know if you're willing to help with this project. In addition to the list of activities in her report, Minister Deb noted she also attends monthly Council meetings. She is hoping to begin a Lutheran Inquiry Class for new and existing members and is aware of four people who are interested. If you would like to participate in this class, please let her know. Other items of note included upcoming vacation in July; Shipwreck Sunday on Sep. 14; St. Francis of Assisi Day and Blessing of Animals service on Oct. 4 in the pavilion; and Harvest Home Sunday on Oct. 19 with Bishop Boudoin in attendance. Looking ahead, St. Paul will observe the 195th anniversary of Shipwreck in September 2026 and the 200th anniversary of Shipwreck in September 2031.

YOUTH MINISTRY REPORT

A written report of youth events and activities was provided in the agenda. Amy Gibson reviewed highlights of year-

to-date events, upcoming activities and ongoing activities, noting youth will be meeting monthly instead of every other week this summer due to scheduling conflicts. They're planning to support mission events on a quarterly basis, with the first quarter Flapjacks & Flannel brunch raising \$650 to support RJ Coldren's mission travel with Cru this summer. In the second quarter they held a yard cleanup day for Christine Kemerley and received a \$150 donation. During the third quarter, youth will be collecting donations for a college gift card basket for young adults (graduates through age 30). There will be a basket in the welcome space for your donation of fuel cards, grocery cards, etc. which will be distributed in late July or early August.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

A written report from this committee was provided by Minister Deb Noll. Two new members are needed to assist with planning and enhancing worship experiences at St. Paul to give glory and honor to God. Please prayerfully consider serving in this capacity, especially if you're aware of a need in worship that is not being met.

TRUSTEES REPORT

Tom Marquart provided a written report in the agenda. The Chair noted that all carpeting throughout the building will be cleaned in June, and cracks in the parking lot will be filled after planting season. Volunteers will be needed for parking lot work.

PARISH EDUCATION REPORT

Emily Clark highlighted two events held since the annual meeting in November 2024 including movie night in February with roughly 60 children and an Easter egg hunt in April with 70+ children attending. VBS is scheduled for July 13–17 with a Sky theme, and many volunteers will be needed. Following VBS, a float will be decorated around the Sky theme for the Arlington Festival Parade. The Outreach Committee is partnering with Parish Board to host the annual church picnic at end–July with children participating in the worship service and a tent for comfortable outdoor seating. The Chair thanked Grant Welte for weeding the playground area.

OUTREACH COMMITTEE REPORT

A written report from this committee was provided in the agenda. Tammy von Stein thanked all who have helped with *Our Daily Bread* community meals and reviewed the mission and vision statements of the committee. Statistics and plans going forward were also presented. This committee is also grateful for congregational participation in other outreach ministries including the support of Good Hope's food pantry, Christian Clearing House programs, Stuff the Bus school supplies, and families in the community. Tammy noted that Outreach is committed to spreading God's love through services within the congregation and throughout the community. Please think about ways you can help keep our community, our committee, and Our Daily Bread missions alive and active. She closed her report with a verse from Galatians 6:9–10.

FINANCIAL REPORT

A written report was provided by Jake Leu. He began by reviewing account balances, noting Council deems our financial situation as healthy. With respect to budget vs. actual for the period Nov–2024 thru Apr–2025, contributions were above what was expected. Jake noted that line item #4140–Missions & Benevolence includes money received from the Trust Fund designated for: Luther Home of Mercy in Williston \$25,000; youth camperships \$1,200; and the LYO Giving Blitz \$1,000. With regard to expenses, everything is falling in line with what was budgeted with the exception of line item #6185–Liability Insurance, which will put us over by a couple hundred dollars due to rate increases. Next year's budget will be adjusted to reflect this increase and our insurance coverage will be reviewed. Another line item that will exceed budget this year is #6310–Church Building, under Repairs & Maintenance, due to new flooring in the fellowship hall. This purchase was approved outside of budget at the annual meeting last November. We still have one payment that will be made when final work on flooring is complete. But overall, we'll still end up in a healthy financial position at the end of the year. Jake noted that more than \$12,000 has been generated by our money market accounts since Oct–2023. This income has been used for various missions as well as Council's Discretionary Fund.

TRUST FUND COMMITTEE

A written report from this committee was attached to the agenda including account balances, dividends earned, and distributions made.

R.J. Coldren thanked the congregation for their financial support of his mission trips. He's looking forward to his next trip to Ocean City, NJ to be part of the community and spread God's word, and couldn't have done it without the gracious support of the congregation.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- The trim around the perimeter of fellowship hall flooring still needs to be installed, after which final payment will be made.
- The portable basketball hoops have been moved back in place with new weights, thanks to those who assisted with this project. Please do NOT hang on the rims; one is already bent, and we want to keep them in good condition.
- A Vice Chair of the congregation is still needed as well as two Worship Committee members. Please prayerfully consider these positions and let the Chair know if you're willing to serve. The Worship Committee meets every other month to plan services, upcoming events, and enrich worship.
- The Chair would also like to have more backup people trained to operate our sound and presentation systems. Please see Jan or Marty Grieser if you can serve in this capacity.

NEW BUSINESS

The following summary was provided to inform members as to how their contributions were distributed in 2024. Designated offerings funded by money market interest and additional donations included:

Discretionary Fund distributions to individuals in need were \$2,100. Trust Fund distributions included \$25,000 to Luther Home of Mercy; \$1,000 for the LYO Giving Blitz; and \$1,200 for youth camperships.

The Chair reported there will be new rules posted in the fellowship hall soon, emphasizing NO kicking balls due to a greater risk of damage. A clean air grate was knocked out recently and repairs had to be made. Council has also discussed the possibility of moving the Shipwreck replica and trophy cases to a different location. In the meantime, please leave the fellowship hall as you found it and parents, please supervise your children.

Discussion was held on machines that would best clean the new flooring in the fellowship hall. The Chair noted that standard mops will not clean it well enough because when they tested a machine after mopping, the water was filthy after just two passes back and forth. The Chair and other members have met with several companies and tested options to determine the right machine for all hard surfaces throughout the building. They recommend a riding scrubber from the Brown Supply Company in Lima. A chariot machine was tested, but it kept stalling due to the soft flooring in fellowship hall. Jason Kemerley has operated riding scrubbers at work. Wayne Young reported a similar machine is used at Cory–Rawson school and it continues to run fine after 15 years, roughly 4 hours a day. The only replacements needed are batteries, squeegees and pads. This type of machine usually retails for \$12,000–13,000 but after negotiating, the Brown Company came down to roughly \$9,000. They will also mount for free a dispenser to add the proper amount of cleaning solution for the machine. This saves the user time and ensures that neither too much nor too little solution is used. Wayne reiterated the difference in mopping floors vs. using a scrubbing machine which actually sucks up the dirt. Typically, what wears out a floor is dirt. So, if you keep the dirt cleaned up, your floor will last much longer. Custodians Jason Kemerley and Allie Settlage have already run this machine and the Trustees will also be trained. There will be a chart created to note when pads need to be changed, and the machine will be inspected monthly prior to every Council meeting to ensure it's in good working order. The price quoted is \$9.015 and there's no tax.

A motion to purchase the scrubber was made by Gary Wilson and seconded by Laurie Laird. Discussion followed. The Chair reported she's looked at used machines from \$4,300–\$6,500 but we don't know their history and there are no guarantees. The Brown Company scrubber has a 1–year warranty and all plastic on the machine is guaranteed much longer. A schedule will be made for weekly cleaning. Wayne Young noted a scrubber like this is a great way to get floors and hallways thoroughly cleaned without having to mop, saving time and energy. Also, it seems that floor cleaning gets done more often because it's quicker and easier. The Chair noted we have purchased large dust mops that should be used after every event <u>and</u> before scrubbing to pick up small pieces of paper, thread, etc. A question was asked about moving tables and chairs every time the scrubber is used. The Chair replied that the custodians will have to move these items every time they use the scrubber, and we're considering a cart to hold the tables. Wayne noted the custodians could go around the tables and chairs periodically to clean up specific spills like they do at Cory–Rawson school. Financial Secretary Jake Leu said we have plenty of money to cover this purchase. Another member noted if you buy used and cheap, you may be getting someone else's problem. Another member noted the machine is for commercial use so although it may cost more, it's built better. Another member asked about wheel attachments to table legs so they could be rolled away instead of sliding across the floor. The motion carried following a show of hands. New rules for fellowship hall use will be posted in a bigger and better format.

The Chair is excited about the future of St. Paul and amazed by all who have stepped up to be the hands and feet of Christ. We continue to seek God's guidance to lead us into the future by bringing his kingdom here on earth.

It is important to the church that we support you through illness and hospitalizations. If you are admitted to Blanchard Valley Hospital for an overnight stay we would like to know.

If you are planning an admission to any hospital, please call the church office at 419–326–3535 to let us know the date you are entering and how long you anticipate staying.

At admission to BVH, planned or unplanned, you (or your spokesperson) will be asked several questions,

- 1. Religion: this may be asked at pre–registration or at admission along with your address, phone number, etc. Please give our denomination.
- 2. If you wish to be on the Hospital Directory and the Religion List. These questions will be asked of you (or your spokesperson) during the "Consent to Treatment" process. Please answer "yes" to both.

In order to protect your privacy the hospital does not routinely call the church to tell us you have been admitted, unless you specifically ask them to call us. We depend on you or your family to let us know if you have been admitted.

If you have been in the hospital for a day or two and have not been visited, please ask your family or nurse to contact the church office.

A new federal law greatly restricts the disclosure of patient information by hospitals. As a result, the pastors and church office may not know that a member of the church has been admitted to the hospital. If you are hospitalized and would like to notify the pastor, it is important that you or a member of your family inform the church office as soon as possible at 419–326–3535 and the secretary will contact the pastor.
